This is encouraged in celebration assemblies with a focus on the week's value, through our school rules of 'Ready, Respectful' Safe' and through timetabled well-being sessions weekly which focus on school rules and expectations. Mutual respect and Liberty/ Tolerance of those of different faiths and beliefs At LSPPS, Mutual respect is understanding that we may all not have the same beliefs and values, but we still respect and appreciate each other for our differences. This is encouraged through our through our enquiry based thematic curriculum and planning, Collective Worship, and within our whole school rules. We have numerous celebration days throughout the year (World Religion Days).

Children are encouraged to look after the school building and contents and to see the link between finance and material possessions. They follow the school rules, which are displayed in every classroom and referred to daily. Each class representative feeds class views into School Council about any matters arising in school that children wish to address and children understand that this is a democratic process. Children learn about key figures in history, who have contributed to positive changes to society and consider how they can emulate these ideas. Children have many opportunities for learning about Great Britain and the wider world around us. Older children are encouraged to support younger children at key times such as lunch times. A huge variety of extra-curricular activities are available to promote a positive mental attitude and team spirit. Children learn about healthy competition and how working together can make us stronger.
